Bible Review

Bible Review

The Objective is the key concept for this weeks lesson. It should be the main focus of the study.

These are the books that we will be summarizing in this lesson. For this series, we will look at the major events rather than individual stories.

These are the books of the Bible we will be memorizing. Each week, we will add more books for the students to learn (new books are in bold). If a student can memorize all the books up to this week's books for the following week, you may give them a prize from the "reward box" found on your cart.

An introductory activity or question that will settle the class, draw their attention to the study and prepare their hearts for God's Word.

Objective This study will review what we have studied during the Bible unit and remind the kids that the Bible is the story of God saving humanity.

Hook

Review the books of the Bible from Genesis to 2 Peter.

On your cart will be a worksheet with all kinds of questions about the Bible. Give the students a minute to fill out the worksheet. Then review the answers with the students (the answer sheet is on page 5 of this packet). Ask if there were any questions they couldn't answer before we started studying the Bible that they can answer now.

Today, we are going to review our Bible unit with a study, review games, and more.

What does the Bible say? This is where we will summarize the major events of the book(s) we are covering in the lesson.

BOOK

Now that we have looked at the individual parts of the Bible, let's back up and review the whole story. The Bible tells the story of God's plan to save the world from sin. It begins with the creation of the world, with mankind at the center of creation. Humans were created to live with God and enjoy Him forever. Unfortunately Adam and Eve, the first man and woman, broke God's command and sinned, which brought death into the world. The Old Testament gives the beginning of God's plan to save us from sin. He began this work in the life of Abraham and his family, who would later become the children of Israel. However, the Israelites kept sinning and breaking God's commands. God promised that He would send a Savior to fix this problem.

The New Testament tells the story of the coming of that Savior, Jesus. Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John tell of His birth and His sinless life, yet He was killed on the cross like a criminal. However, by dying on the cross, He paid the penalty for our sins, and then He rose again from the dead. Now, He has returned to heaven, but He offers eternal life with Him to anyone who would repent of their sins and trust what He did on the cross. The Bible ends by telling us that one day, Jesus will return and destroy sin once and for all. Then we will be in heaven with Him forever and there will be no more sin.

LOOK

Over the last few months, we learned a lot about the Bible. We have studied where it came from, why we have it, what it's about, and have memorized the books of the Bible. Today, we want to spend some time reviewing what we have learned.

First, we want to go over what the Bible is. The Bible is the Word of God. It was written by 40 human authors, but it was inspired by God, meaning the Holy Spirit led the authors to write what God wanted them to write. The Bible is made up of 66 books divided into two testaments. There are 39 books in the Old Testament and 27 books in the New Testament. The Bible tells us about who God is, what He has done, and what our lives should look like as a result.

We also want to go over the storyline of the Bible. The Bible may be made up of many books, stories, poems, and other writings, but it tells one big story, the story of God saving humanity. Each book in the Bible is a part of God's story. When we read the Bible, we don't want to look at it as a bunch of little stories about how to be a good person, but the great story of how God has saved us.

As we look at each section of the Bible storyline, we will seek to answer to questions: First, why was this included in the Bible? Second, how does this passage apply to my life?

LOOK (Continued)

Over the last few months, we have seen how the various parts of the Bible contribute to the larger story. Today, we want to go back and review each of these parts and see how they fit into the big picture. At the back of this packet is a list of different review games you can play to review the books of the Bible and the characters and events that they talk about. Use these or other games to go over what we have learned with the class and take time to go over any parts the kids have forgotten or are unsure of. The hope is that these students will walk away from this unit with a better understanding of what each individual part of the Bible is about and how they fit together to tell one story.

Finally, we want the kids to see that they too are part of the story. The Bible is the story of God saving humanity, but in order to be saved, they need to trust in Jesus and what He did on the cross. The Bible gives us the story of the Gospel, but it is up to us to respond in faith to God's saving plan in the work of Jesus.

What is my response to this passage of Scripture? How should my life change according to what this passage teaches me? What are the practical things I can do throughout the week to make this true in my life?

TOOK

Present the Gospel and give the students an opportunity to ask Jesus to be their Savior and Lord.

As a class, memorize the books of the Bible Genesis to Revelation.

Pray: Thank the Lord for giving us His Word. Praise Him for sending His Son Jesus to save us.

Parent Question: Why is it important to study the Bible?

Appendix B

Bible Games

- **Sword Drills** – When the teacher says, “Swords up,” the students lift their Bibles over their heads. The teacher then gives a verse reference (John 3:16) and the students all race to see who can find it first. Whoever finds the verse first stands up and the teacher calls on them to read the verse out loud.
- **Bible Bingo** – Hand out the Bingo boards from the cart. There should be an Old Testament and New Testament set. Call out books from the appropriate Testament until someone has 5 in a row.
- **Name that Book** – Choose a book of the Bible. Name events that take place in that book until one of the students is able to guess the book you are thinking of.
- **Next Book** – Name a book of the Bible and have the students race to see who can name the next book first. You can also switch it up and have the students give the previous book.
- **Hangman (books of the Bible edition)** – Play hangman and make the answer a book of the Bible.
- **Scrambled Bible** – Write a list of books of the Bible on the board out of order. Have 2 students race to write the books in the correct order.
